1. What Makes a Replica Project Successful?

A convincing result depends on more than surface realism. Facial proportions, target age, expression, hairstyle, body proportions, clothing, pose, and the intended display environment should all support the same person and the same period of life.

- Use the clearest front, profile, and three-quarter references available.
- Separate documented features from details that require interpretation.
- Confirm the intended age, expression, hairstyle, and pose before mold making.
- Review the 3D model carefully while structural revisions are still practical.

*Material performance varies by formulation, construction, finishing, handling, and display environment. The better choice depends on the project rather than a universal claim that one material is always superior.

3. Typical Applications

- **Museums & historical exhibitions:** recreate documented people, occupations, rooms, or period scenes.
- **Memorial halls & family collections:** preserve a recognizable person at an agreed age, expression, and presentation.
- **Royal, celebrity & public-figure displays:** combine facial likeness with period-correct clothing, hair, pose, and context.
- **Corporate heritage displays:** reconstruct founders, workers, or historical workplaces around authentic company history.

4. From Reference to Finished Figure

1	Reference review	Organize photos, portraits, videos, measurements, clothing references, and display requirements.
2	3D character development	Establish facial structure, proportions, age, expression, and pose.
3	Model approval	Confirm major visual decisions before physical production.
4	Mold & silicone production	Translate the approved form into the physical replica and assemble the required structure.
5	Painting & detailing	Add skin coloration, eyes, hair, eyebrows, facial hair, nails, and other visible details.
6	Inspection & delivery planning	Check likeness, pose, stability, dimensions, installation, packaging, and handling requirements.

5. Project Planning Checklist

- **Character references:** the clearest available photos, portraits, videos, sculptures, or archival materials.
- **Target age:** define which stage of the person's life should be recreated.
- **Pose & expression:** standing, seated, holding an object, interacting with furniture, or another scene-specific position.
- **Dimensions:** target height, body proportions, furniture dimensions, and available installation space.
- **Clothing & accessories:** period-correct costume, footwear, jewelry, tools, props, or personal objects.
- **Project logistics:** quantity, permanent or traveling display, packaging, installation, and delivery needs.
- **Permissions & privacy:** confirm that submitted reference materials may be used for the intended project and discuss how private files will be handled.

6. Care, Display & Longevity

There is no single guaranteed service life for every silicone figure. Long-term condition depends on the silicone formulation, pigments and surface finish, display environment, physical handling, structural support, and maintenance practices.

- Use appropriate structural support for the intended standing, seated, or scene-specific pose.
- Follow manufacturer-specific cleaning guidance; avoid untested solvents, aggressive chemicals, and abrasive tools.
- Plan for light, heat, UV exposure, and visitor contact according to the exhibition environment.
- For traveling exhibitions, consider repeated handling, vulnerable details, detachable parts, protective packaging, and reusable flight cases where appropriate.

7. What to Look for in a Manufacturer

- Real person-specific custom projects rather than only standard-model modifications.
- 3D modeling and an approval stage before mold making.
- Evidence of mold preparation, silicone production, painting, hair work, and quality inspection.
- Clear communication about revisions, final dimensions, installation, packaging, and shipping.
- Reference-to-finished-figure examples that show how the project was developed.

8. Before You Request a Project Evaluation

Prepare the clearest available reference images together with the preferred age, pose, expression, target dimensions, clothing, accessories, intended display environment, quantity, and delivery requirements. A more complete brief makes it easier to evaluate feasibility, customization scope, and production planning.
